Happy end of quarter I, Ram Fam!

I hope this message finds you well as we approach the upcoming fall break. As quarter one of the 2024-2025 school year comes to a close, I wanted to reflect on some tasks that families can do to make the rest of the school year more regulated, organized, and productive.

Our office staff is inundated with items that were forgotten or left at home, so having a place in the house where only school supplies are kept is a great way to help kids remember to take them to school. It takes, at minimum, 30 days to develop a habit, so give the new space some time to see if it helps with remembering all school supplies (sports bags, water bottles, lunch boxes, school projects) for the day.

Communication with students is also important! We have several students who can't remember how they are getting home for the day, so having a whiteboard calendar in the house near the school supply spot with pickup places/times and important events written on it (in fun whiteboard marker colors) will give children a visual reminder to go along with the several times you told them where and when they will get picked up.

Most of all, we want to see your fabulous children here at school, so please promote the importance of attendance. No matter if an absence is excused or unexcused, it is still an absence - it is still a loss of learning time. Of course, do not send your child to school if they are unwell, but encourage them to attend as often as possible.

After quarter one, I am sure your middle schooler is ready for a break! With the extended time off, it's important to keep our students engaged and productive to avoid boredom and maintain a healthy routine. Here are a few suggestions to help keep them active during the break:

- I. Encourage reading: Whether it's fiction, non-fiction, or a topic they're passionate about, reading is a great way for students to explore new ideas and expand their knowledge.
- 2. Creative projects: Fall break is the perfect time for students to dive into creative hobbies like drawing, writing, or crafting. Persuade them to start a fun project that they can feel proud to show off when they return to school.
- 3. Physical activity: Keeping active is vital! Whether it's riding bikes, hiking, or playing a favorite sport, regular physical activity helps keep energy levels high and boredom at bay.
- 4. Learning games: There are many online educational games and apps that can keep students' minds sharp while still allowing them to have fun. Consider finding one that focuses on math, reading, or problem-solving.
- 5. Get them cooking: Encourage your children to find a recipe and have them make it for the family. Whether it is boxed mac and cheese, or Croquembouche, having children take ownership and agency in a major life activity, like feeding the family, is a great learning experience.

Finally, I wanted to let you know that I will be out of the office for the next few weeks due to foot surgery. I will truly miss seeing Meadows students during this time, but I look forward to returning to school and racing around campus on my little foot scooter - trust me, I have souped it out! 



9/11 AT MEADOWS

9/11/2001. The day that changed the US forever. Four planes were hijacked by terrorists. Two hit the World Trade Center aka the Twin Towers. The 3rd plane hit the Pentagon, the Headquarters of the United States Department of Defense. The final plane was planning to hit somewhere in D.C., but the passengers on board managed to take the plane back and crash it into the field. 2,996 people sadly passed away on this tragic day, around 343 of those people were firefighters. None of us students were alive to have experienced this, but all of our parents and staff members here at school were. Many teachers at Meadows have ties to NY, as they have family who live there or grew up there themselves. Ms. Cohen was a college student in upstate NY at the time of the attacks and her family knew people in NYC that day. Another one of the teachers was greatly impacted by this day. Unlike many, Mr. Collins had multiple connections to what happened that day. The first being that his older brother was a firefighter, he was at Logan Airport in Boston. His brother walked past all of the terrorists that hijacked the planes. The second connection he had was that his brother in law, Paul, was in a meeting with Morgan Stanley. 62 floors up in one of the twin towers. Someone came down the hall explaining that they needed to get out or else they would've been stuck. Thankfully he got out. The third and final connection he had with this day is that one of his former classmates worked at the Pentagon. He had just gotten off the phone with his wife, shortly after one of the planes hit the area of the building he was in causing him to pass away. In honor of what happened on this day, Mr. Collins does a stair walk with all of his classes. While students are holding their backpack and one is also carrying the American flag, they climb as many flights of stairs as they can in 30 minutes. It honors what all of the firefighters had to do to save the people in the incident.

Many firefighters were impacted by 9/11 even if they weren't in New York helping people that day. This year on 9/11 Student Council invited two firefighters Megan Tranter and Adam Skiver to talk to our 5th and 6th graders about 9/11 and what they do as firefighters. Both of them are captains of the fire house and have been firefighters for 24 years. Their daughter is a 5th grader here at Meadows, and a student in Ms. Cohen's class. They mentioned that they had only been working for about a year in the fire fighter industry when 9/11 occurred. Adam was watching the news when he saw an older firefighter thanking the younger firefighter for helping save multiple lives. "This is the moment I realized why I became a firefighter." Adam stated during the presentation. Both of them agreed that their favorite part about being a firefighter is getting to save people on a daily basis.



A day to remember!

Students were able to ask questions throughout the presentation. We learned through a question that firefighters do much more than just fight fires. They help in any emergency that 911 gets called for. Adam is trained to save people that are stuck or hurt on mountains. He is also trained to be lowered from a helicopter in case of emergencies. Megan is trained to help if a gas leak occurs. She knows exactly what to do if 911 is called about a gas leak in someone's house or any other building. Another question was about the dogs in their fire house which is home to 10 dogs ranging from all ages. The dog that they brought to school was named Jessie. Jessie is a search and rescue dog and is trained to search when someone is missing from a collapsed building. After the presentation was over NJHS and STUCO donated water and healthy snacks to the firehouse and the firefighter that worked with Megan and Adam. "We liked getting to see the dog and learn about what he does. We also liked getting to see the firetruck." said 6th graders Caitlyn Y. and Dot S. Jack G stated, "I liked getting to learn more about what happened on 9/11."

Many lives were impacted by the events of 9/11. There are many ways to honor those who passed away. Mr. Collins' stair climb and donating food to fire houses are some of the many ways to help and honor what the firefighters did to help the community on the day of 9/11. In Ms. Vacanti's class, students created a memorial artwork that included collage and watercolor. This artwork will be displayed at the Flight 93 Memorial in Pennsylvania! Students in Ms. Cohen's, Mr. Goff's, Mr. Collins, and Mrs. Tornquist's classes drew pictures and wrote thank you notes to firefighters, thanking them for the tireless effort in protecting our community. Even just raising awareness can be a big help and spread knowledge of this day. The date of 9/11 is not the only day to remember and honor this day. Everyday is a day to honor the events that happened on the day of 9/11, and here at Meadows, NJHS (with advisors Ms. Cohen and Mrs. Tracy), Student Council (advisors Ms. Vacanti and Ms. Showerman), and other groups know the importance of recognizing those that serve our community and do our best to help give back as well.

ATTENDANCE FAQs

(Everything you didn't think you wanted to know about attendance!)



How do I report an absence?

Absences should be reported by a parent/guardian by 9am by calling 602-664-7620 and leaving a message or by emailing <u>meadowsattendance@madisoned.org</u>. Be sure to state your student's name, reason for absence, and your relationship to the student in your message.

I reported my student absent, why were they marked unexcused?!

Absent students will always initially be marked "A" for Unexcused Absence in 1st period but will be changed to "AE" for Excused Absence once the absence calls/emails have been logged (usually by 10am).

What if I don't call/email about my student's absence?

If a call or email has not been received for an absent student, the student will be marked "A" for Unexcused Absence and the automated calls/emails will go out to parents/guardians around 10am.

I already told the teachers my student would be absent, do I need to call attendance too?

Yes! You are welcome to notify your student's teachers about an absence, but you will still need to call or email the attendance line to report the absence.

Can I report that my student will be absent on a future date?

Yes, you can email/call about a future absence at any time. Please be sure to leave another message if plans change.

What if I forgot to call out my student by 9am?!

If you forget to call or email about your student's absence, you can still do so up to 24 hours later to have it excused.

How many days can my student miss?

If a student misses more than 9 days per semester, or 18 days for the total school year, they would be considered to have excessive absences which would result in communication or further action by Administration.

Do I need to call ahead of time if I'm checking out my student early?

If you are going to check out your student early, you do not need to call ahead. You will need to come into the office, show ID, and then your student will be called down.

Do I need to call ahead if I'm bringing my student in late and do I have to sign them in?

If you are bringing in your student late, you do not have to call/email but you are welcome to do so. However, when your student arrives late to campus, you will need to either come into the office to sign them in or call/email the attendance line in order to excuse the tardy. Students who arrive late without any parent contact will be marked "Tardy Unexcused". *After 3 late check-ins or early check-outs, you would be encouraged to provide doctor's notes or other documentation.

Additional Info:

On rare occasions, like a day with very high absences, there could be a delay in entering excused absences. If you know you called/emailed about your student's absence, but still received an unexcused automated call/email, please wait until later in the day before calling/emailing again. Most corrections are taken care of as the day moves along.

Student attendance directly impacts our school's overall "grade". The Arizona State Board of Education evaluates schools based on various academic factors, including attendance. If you want your student to be at an "A" school, please do your part by limiting absences.
